


Centenary Celebrations

Excitement is growing about our coming celebration on November 16th. This term the planting of grass trees and other native plants in our Centenary Garden began.








Literacy and other work

News from Upper Primary



Upper Primary Saba

Year 5 and 6



You will have seen them in Saba, on visits to SIDE and in the many Metropolitan and Regional visits which HaSS staff have engaged in throughout the year.

Guest Speaker - Year 11 Politics and Law



On Wednesday the 29th August, we welcomed, His Honour Chief Judge Kevin Sleight (left), Chief Judge of the District Court of WA, to SIDE as a guest speaker for the Year 11 Politics and Law course. This presented

a wonderful opportunity for students to engage personally with a member of the judiciary and collect up-to-date information which directly relates to the course.

His Honour spoke with students via Saba (and using a webcam) and covered topics such as the rule of law, appointment and removal of judges, the role of courts, the jury system, the process of an indictable trial and current reforms. A point of note included changes to the Evidence Act which has made allowances for offenders with a propensity for certain offences or multiple similar offences to be tried at one time. Interestingly, whilst many defence lawyers were concerned when this reform was introduced, in many cases where 'propensity evidence' has been included juries have still returned verdicts of 'not guilty'. This point gives students a very clear example to use when assessing the procedures of the WA Justice system as required by the syllabus.

His Honour also outlined the details of some current reforms and introduction of the 'Intermediary Scheme' which allows for vulnerable witnesses and children to be assessed for limitations in their ability to give evidence prior to a trial and then a report presented to the court. A 'ground rules' hearing then occurs where all parties agree to how best to proceed (eg what can and cannot be asked as a witness may have speech impediments or if a 'comfort dog' could be made available to help children when giving evidence). The effect of these reforms allow for more witnesses to be able to engage in the legal process. This change to the pre-trial process will be introduced in courts in Perth and the Pilbara in the coming year.

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At the conclusion of Chief Judge Sleight's discussion, students had the opportunity to ask His Honour some questions, the standard of which was exceptional. His Honour even commented that the questions were better than those he was asked recently by practicing lawyers. Very few people outside of the legal profession would know of these changes and thus our students have accurate contemporary and accurate examples to use when completing assessments.



At the conclusion of the session, students were required to submit a list of (at least) five things they learnt in



a Moodle Forum. As the session was recorded, students will be able to review the material for their up-coming assessment and exam using the notes from Text Chat that were emailed to students.

Thanks must go to Narelle Carlon and Steve Dans from OTL as well as Shirley McLean for their assistance in organising this event. Tania Sturges from Chief Judge Sleight's chambers was also very helpful during the planning process.

Year 9 Humanities - Food Security

It has been a fantastic year for the Humanities Learning Area and the Year 9 Geography course is no exception. We have been investigating world biomes, food production and issues relating to sustainability, food security (access to enough safe and healthy food) and poverty. These topics have provided some interesting points of discussion

amongst the four classes. Many students were unaware of the level of uneven distribution of resources and the basic requirements for the production of food. It was also a surprise that in a wealthy country such as Australia, there is an issue with food security. Much of this is associated with homelessness and that on any given night there are over 100,000 homeless people. Students who regularly attend SIDE have seen the homeless people in and around Leederville and commented on their situation, with empathy and care well beyond their years.



For students to be aware of the issue and 'practice gratitude' we asked them to contribute to a food collection. It has since been donated to St Vincent De Paul ('Vinnie's'), a charity which works with homeless people. We had a fantastic response with 3 large boxes of groceries collected from students over 2 weeks. Well done to the SIDE community for contributing. A representative from Vinnie's made contact to thank SIDE for its contribution as the need for such donations is ever-increasing. We look forward to seeing further involvement by in community activities in the future.

As part of their coursework, students were also required to complete a poster for World Hunger Day on the 16th of October. The best of the posters will be entered into an international competition run by the Food and Agriculture Organisation of the United Nations. Students will be emailed if their poster has been chosen for submission.

Science

WACE Preparation

Year 12 students are preparing for their final exams. During this term, in addition to the weekly Saba sessions, our highly experienced staff have been providing online revision tutorial sessions in the different WACE courses. These sessions were specifically designed to focus on exam preparation. They concentrated on exam type questions, and how to structure answers to gain the highest possible marks. Hopefully study plans are in place and students are practising exam type questions that they can access from their Moodle course and WACE Study Guides. Year 12 students are reminded to check

the syllabus and course outlines to ensure they have a thorough understanding of the content being examined. The syllabus statements are a good starting point for developing study notes. Remember to read the exam cover page and instructions carefully to ensure all the required questions are answered correctly. We wish our year 12 students all the very best for the WACE exams.

Science week

Science week (13 August – 17 August) was well received by SIDE students. There were many events that were covered in detail in the SIDE 'Science Lab' Moodle site.

Our daily quiz proved a bit of a hit with Ella from Shark Bay/Denham solving the first day's puzzle. The last day's challenge was to identify all your teachers. This had a very high level of participation– but some students found it a bit tricky identifying all the Science staff.

conjunction with Inspiring Australia and Scitech, Yamilee presented a live online event where she showcased her STEM from dance program.

Yamilée Toussaint is the Founder & CEO of STEM from Dance. After earning a B.S. in Mechanical Engineering at MIT and being an avid dancer for 25 years, she switched to get a M.S. in Teaching from Pace University and taught high school algebra in an under-served community through Teach For America. She started STEM from Dance with the hope that a strong dance and STEM supplemental education would help to increase the number of underrepresented minority girls across the world who pursue a STEM college education. This online event was well received by SIDE students.

School Visits

The Science staff have been very busy with regional school visits this term.

As part of the Science STEM Outreach program, one visit took Natalie Cooper, Ai Kamiya-Murray, Diana Tomazos and Alex Berentzen to visit Leinster and Laverton schools.

The Science staff at SIDE have been incorporating more open-ended STEM activities into our Science curriculum. This visit was the perfect opportunity to work alongside our regional school colleagues.

New ATSE STELR equipment, purchased by SIDE was taken along and used to introduce students at Laverton and Leinster to new ideas about sustainability and renewable energy. ATSE STELR is all about hands-on, inquiry based investigation strategies that involve students in direct experience- based learning activities.

The Science department at SIDE have embarked on this program to better engage remote, regional and indigenous students. It helps us all deliver a richer and more meaningful learning experience to isolated students.

Ever wondered why when someone says think about your most embarrassing memory, you can instantly remember it and feel like you are back in that moment again? If our memory can be that good, why then when someone tells you to remember to put the rubbish bin out, do you always seem to forget?

health and nutrition practices.


Did you know?

- The Kakadu Plum is native to the top end of Northern Australia and is the richest known source of Vitamin C in the world.
- Panicum decompositum grows in the sand at Lake Mungo and requires only minimal rainfall to grow into a highly nutritious grain that was turned into flour and baked. The Gurandji Munjie group are currently revitalising this native crop and research is being undertaken by CSIRO focussing on the nutritional value of this grain.

Year 7 Nature Play Passports

In Saba, the Year 7s have been exploring the opportunities for outdoor physical activity and have recently been encouraged to sign up for a Nature Play passport by their teachers Jane Bourke and Silke Hightet. Students engaged in interactive activities designed






Extending learning beyond school

Japanese news

Ongerup Primary School visit

Ongerup Primary School is situated in the town of Ongerup, approximately 150 kilometres north of Albany and close to the scenic Stirling Ranges. The school currently has 18 students enrolled - from Kindy to Year 6. Two classrooms operate, Kindergarten - Year 2 and Years 3 - 6. There are two school buses that transport 8 students to school from outlying farms. The remainder of the students live in the town.

The school Principal is Mark Bruce and he is very supportive of the SIDE Japanese online program. The school runs and supervises two Japanese classes using an interactive white board from the library: The Joeys (Years 1 – 2) and the Boomers (Years 3 – 6). Separate to the SIDE online program, the Kindergarten and Pre-primary students participate (via Ipads) in the Early Learning Languages Australia (ELLA) program which is a digital, play-based language learning program aimed at students in pre-school. Michael Boyle is the current Japanese SIDE teacher for the school.

Kathy Lamberto and Michael Boyle visited the school on the 22nd August this term. Both classes were combined for the whole day and participated in a variety of language activities.

To commence the day, students were given an opportunity to introduce themselves before participating in activities which recalled their basic knowledge in counting and hiragana. In the second session of the day, the story of 'Urashima Tarou' was told with stimulus pictures and used to introduce the basic terminology for the four seasons. Students then completed some hiragana and kanji writing activities and also created a Styrofoam block print related to the story. The Boomers took part in preparing three different types of 'Okonomiyaki' (Japanese omelettes with mushroom, prawns and bacon) for the whole school to eat at lunch time. During cooking preparation time, the kindergarten and pre-primary students joined the Joey's and made origami, sang songs and listened to a story. The day concluded with more songs and a recap of the day's activities.



Artists throughout history have recorded and reflected on their 'sense of place', their physical and felt place in the world. Where do you learn, teach or connect with SIDE?



Mathematics

Staffing

Michael Wheeler took leave in Term 3 and was replaced as HOLA by Greg Piggott. Sandra Wagner joined the team to teach the classes affected by these events.

Anne Paull also took a well-earned long-service-leave and Diya Mehra Soni will continue to teach her classes into Term 4.

Senior School

As we move into Term 4 all Year 11 and Year 12 ATAR students should endeavour to increase their focus on the final examination.

Students studying General mathematics courses should ensure all work is completed and submitted.

ATAR and Examinations

Moodle courses for all ATAR subjects include past examination papers as well as other exam-style revision documents. These are the best form of revision that students can undertake in preparation for their end of year examinations. The exams cover objectives from the whole year and comprise 25% of the year total.

It is essential that students demonstrate their understanding of concepts in the limited time-frame of an examination. Thus, students should practice maximising their score by working under the same conditions of an examination. Exemplar papers should be attempted in the time allocated: 5 minutes reading and 50 minutes working for the non-calculator section, 10 minutes reading and 100 minutes working for calculator-assumed.

A mathematics syllabus lists objectives under particular areas of study, for example Networks or Calculus. Students should refer to the syllabus regularly and realistically monitor their strengths and weaknesses. (A student should know they are 'good' at Finance but 'weak' at Matrices.)

Improve the weak but practice the good.

Study for examinations should be directed at improving a student's understanding of concepts they find challenging. However, it is important to maximise the marks gained for concepts students find easier. This requires constant practice of exam-style questions on those concepts.

Know the vocabulary.

Examiners are required to use the language of the syllabus in constructing examination questions. Students cannot have words or expressions clarified in an assessment if they are contained in the syllabus.

Students are encouraged to develop a glossary with definitions they understand.

Develop personal and useful examination notes.

Students are permitted notes on both sides of two A4 pages in the calculator-assumed section of the examination. These notes are not permitted in the calculator-free section.

The pages must not be folded nor have pieces stuck to the notes (gluing, tape). They may be handwritten or typed, downloaded from any source, coloured and of any font size. Above all, they must be useful!! The development of effective notes takes place over time, not hastily written just prior to the examination.

Have an examination strategy.

Despite the best efforts of examiners some papers are too complex and others take too long to complete. It is extremely rare that a student will score 100% on an examination. Rather, the intent should be to gain as many marks as possible in the time allowed.

Teachers will have slightly different views on strategies students should employ to maximise their score in an examination. Students should take note of whatever advice they receive and develop their personalised plan. The important thing is to work the paper to a plan.

Some do's and don'ts to consider:

- Use reading time to identify the syllabus concept in questions. The context may be confusing but the processes used to address the concept will be the same.
- Do not do the questions in numerical order. Rather, do the 'easy' concepts first, regardless of where they are in the paper.
- Do not dawdle over a question, even if you are sure you could get the answer. Valuable time will be eroded in attempting to obtain small marks, often resulting in students running out of time to finish the exam.
- Plan to generate some time (15 minutes perhaps) at the end of the exam that allows you to address those questions you think you could answer with a bit more time. It is recommended a student plan to attempt

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5 marks every 4 minutes, it is not a waste of time to monitor this during the assessment. This should be achievable in at least the first half of the allocated time.

- Never finish working. Always use time to check solutions, ensure answers are highlighted and that arguments are clearly stated.

Years 7 to 10

It is important that students further develop or maintain their focus throughout Term 4.

Learning mathematics is predominantly a skills-based continuum. Missing one concept often makes it very difficult to learn subsequent concepts.

Year 10 students will transition to Year 11 courses where penalties apply for late or non-submission of assessments.

‘Study’ has one essential component: **doing questions**.

School and Student Visits

A number of schools and students were visited during Term 3. Developing relationships with students and experiencing their individual learning circumstances is often a key element in improving understanding of curriculum concepts.

Ron Evans has been carefully considering how students demonstrate understanding in the Foundation Mathematics senior school course. He has developed strategies for engaging students that pays more attention to the individual circumstances of students. These strategies focus on both curriculum delivery and assessment. One particular school has been a major focus of this work. His latest visit report included:

On my third visit to the school this year the focus was on assessment using functional maths topics such as Hairdressing Maths/Catering Maths/Garage Maths, individual learning pathway planning sessions designed to meet each students’ specific needs. An important part of the learning experience is getting students to reflect on their environment and circumstances and thus the student teaches the teacher, encouraging learning as a co-operative activity involving both student and teacher. SIDE’s commitment to this school is reaping rewards because every student has shown growth in mathematics understandings (shown on Grade Rubrics), our ongoing

relationship with the students makes them more comfortable to ask for help and receive it. The importance of wait time was evident when asking questions – one student eventually answered a complicated question where Ron would likely prompt earlier in other circumstances. Ron's learning on this visit included he cannot walk on sharp rocks barefooted, that oysters taste very nice fresh (but the taste stays in your mouth for hours) and, importantly, that the United Kingdom recently returned ancestors remains to the community. This last is very significant to the community and is recognised by white poles in a graveyard.



To Ponder

For mathematics, success at school requires considerable work. Many adults say they are “no good” at mathematics. If you are one of those people:

1. Do you decide not to buy something because you cannot afford it?
2. Do you estimate the length or area of something rather than measure it?
3. Do you present a constructed argument to someone?

If you said ‘yes’ to any of these three questions then why do you think you are no good at mathematics? You are good at mathematics.

Mathematics teachers wish all Year 12 ATAR students the very best in their final examinations and all Year 12 students every success in the future. We hope that students will focus in Term 4 so that they know they have improved their understanding of mathematics at the end of the year.



Learning Support

The second half of the year seems to be going faster than the first half with third term flying by. It was a busy term and we have had a small increase in enrolments. Due to these we have welcomed two new staff members, teacher Kim Ganfield, who is with us for two days per week and Education Assistant (EA), Shekiah Adams, giving Learning Support a fulltime EA. Shekiah will be working three days and Jo Duczynski two. Both EA's will offer additional support and teaching time to the students.

Hedland Senior High School

Hedland SHS located in South Hedland in the Pilbara, is an Independent Public School catering for students from Years 7 to 12. Local industry also plays a significant role in supporting some the schools programs, facilities and VET opportunities. 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Kandiwal

Kandiwal is SIDE's most remote community and is located on the Mitchell Plateau in a designated national park. The community consists of an extended family group. The main family groups are the Goonacks, Phillips and Pindans. Pat Goonack is the family matriarch and was instrumental in the establishment of the community in 2004/5. Initially the community used some infrastructure left by a mining company that explored the area for bauxite. From a single dwelling the community has increased to include a number of houses, two school buildings, a greenhouse and numerous satellite dishes. There are plans for more houses to be built for family members keen to live at Kandiwal. The generator has been replaced by solar power.

There have been enrolments with SIDE for the last 12 years. The younger children are educated through the Kimberley School of the Air (KSOTA).

Gay Tierney and Shane Murray met with Pat and Year 12 Kandiwal Workplace Learning student, Taniayah. Taniayah's workplace is **Ngauwudu Safari Camp-Outback Spirit** where her trainers are Melina and Brett. Both of them have Certificate IVs in Training and Assessment.

Taniayah works from 5.00 to 8.00pm each evening. Her tasks include setting tables, preparing food and communicating with the tourists. She showed us around the tourist camp area and on our return to the community we walked through the APT camp and saw the community greenhouses. Taniayah was assisted with her workplace learning skills focus questions and completion of her Leaver's profile. She is on track to achieve one-unit credit but the aim is to try and award her two unit credits for ADWPL. She is conscientious about Saba attendance.

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
ATAR Year 12 Saba Session

The Library Resource Centre has had an exciting term with two guest presenters on Saba and the continuation of the Wide Reading Program which encourages students to enjoy and discuss their reading. All three were attended by both primary and secondary students.

CBCA Book Week at SIDE



The SIDE Library Resource Centre celebrated another wonderful Children's Book Council of Australia (CBCA) Book Week with our primary and secondary students the week of 20th to 24th August. This year's theme was 'Find your Treasure' and we enjoyed sharing great Australian book treasures with our students.



Teacher librarian/pirate Liz Allen ran Book Week sessions with Early Childhood, Middle Primary and Upper Primary Saba classes. Students came dressed up as their favourite characters and learned about some of the shortlisted books in the CBCA Book of the Year Early Childhood, Picture Book and Younger Readers categories.



For secondary students, teacher librarian Harry Potter, alias Amy Rosato ran a Book Week session for the Year 7-10 students. Students judged the six shortlisted books in the Older Readers category according to students' criteria for what makes a good book for older readers. The group managed to pick the two honour books, *In the Dark Spaces* and *Mallee Boys*. But the spooky suspense of *Ballad for a Mad Girl* ticked more of the boxes for our students than the actual winner *Take Three Girls*!

Thank you to all our students for dressing up and participating in these sessions - we thoroughly enjoyed 'Finding your Treasure' with our students and promoting and celebrating the best of Australian children's literature.

Term 3 Wide Reading in English

This term's session for Wide Reading in English was called 'SIDE Insider' and the purpose was to 'Find out what your friends are reading!'

Each Year 7-10 English class was given a short questionnaire the week before their session with Amy, to fill out anonymously in Saba (or in person for our visiting students), to determine every student's current reading habits. Questions included:

- What is the last book you read?
- Where do you get your stories from? (e.g. books, movies, YouTube, blogs, newspapers etc.)
- If you could read any book right now, what would it be?

Answers were honest and varied, and students (and teachers!) had an interesting time looking at and discussing their results in the session the following week. Students even got to see what their teacher was reading! Lots of great books were recommended from student to student, and many books have been borrowed during and since the sessions. Feedback from students and teachers has been very positive, with students enjoying the variety of books they got to see.

Each class also looked at the top three loaned books (for pleasure) by students their age at SIDE in 2017. Year 8 top three in 2017 were the Harry Potter (series), the Geek Girl (series), and *The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas*, which is again proving to be popular this year. Students voted to hear an excerpt read aloud from one of the top three titles, then used the cover and what they'd learned from the excerpt to try and win the 'Judge a book by its cover' quiz.

Term 3 Authors Online - Kylie Howarth

The Resource Centre hosted author/illustrator Kylie Howarth, who is a graphic artist, has published three picture books, is working on a fourth and has almost finished her first short novel. She studied through SIDE when it was the Distance Education Centre (DEC) whilst completing Year 4 as her family travelled around Australia. Her visit linked with our 2018 Children's Book Council of Australia (CBCA) Book Week celebrations. Kylie presented two online sessions for our Primary School students, one with Pre Primary to Year 4 students and one with Year 5 and 6 students. She shared writing and drawing ideas with a particular focus on her picture books 1,2 Pirate Stew and Fish Jam and Chip. Kylie uses a range of textures in her paintings including corrugated cardboard, bubble wrap, sticks, stones, rocks and vegetables such as potatoes. She showed the students how she built up the textures and



finally how they looked when the book was published. The webcam was set up and Kylie drew with the students, her characters Toot and Chip. The students were able

National Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Our school participated in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (Data Collection) again this year. This Data Collection takes place in government, Catholic and Independent schools across Australia, and provides valuable information about supports required for a broad group of students. This enables Australian and State governments to better target support and resources in schools. This in turn helps schools give students with disability the support they need.

The Data Collection is not limited to students with diagnosed disabilities. It uses a very broad definition of disability, taken from the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, which describe a broad range of health and learning conditions for which schools are required to provide 'reasonable adjustments' to support students to participate on the same basis as other students.

The Data Collection took place during Terms 2 and 3. No personal or identifying information about any student is included in the data collection.
