### **ONLINE TEACHING & LEARNING**

#### **STREAM ROOM TRIAL**

The Stream Room in the SIDE Multimedia Centre was created at the end of 2020 to enable teachers to experiment with flexible approaches to lessons using state-of-the art webcasting technology.

It was anticipated that using this room would:

- remove the need for headsets
- allow teachers to actively teach using strategies such as demonstrating, team-teaching, and role-playing
- allow guest speakers and special events to be conducted by the meeting host without the need for a studio technician to operate equipment.

In Term 3 the Stream Room was opened up to teachers across all learning areas. Each learning area nominated a teacher to take a weekly, onehour lesson for a term. Teachers involved provided feedback on the stream room's use, and promoted the teaching possibilities it provides.

Teachers have enjoyed the flexibility it provides. In Languages, primary school students were encouraged to get up out of their seats to join in with a Japanese song and exercise session. Secondary English students were treated to engaging and interactive lessons delivered in a free and animated way. Media students were part of a virtual classroom in a lesson on practical exam revision techniques, using a variety of cameras such as the document camera to examine images, and other classroom features like the whiteboard for brainstorming and recording.

The trial will continue in Term 4 with a new round of teachers lining up to share this unique way of delivering lessons to our lucky students. It's hoped that the room will serve as a model for future directions in online teaching and learning at SIDE.



#### **MICROSOFT ONEDRIVE**

#### HOME-BASED STUDENTS

The Student Services team plays a major role in supporting SIDE students who are home-based for their study program. A significant part of the Student Coordinator's role is to understand the circumstances behind a home-based student's enrolment as well as to arrange tailored ongoing support for their particular needs. The initial adjustment from a face-to-face teaching and learning model to an online environment model can be extremely challenging for many SIDE students. In particular, home-based students and their parents/caregivers often require extra guidance and encouragement to manoeuvre through these challenges such as studying in extreme isolation, or studying while travelling constantly.



The Student Coordinator role in these circumstances cannot be underestimated and is one that requires a high level of communication, sensitivity, persistence and understanding.

Aidan, Year 11, has successfully been managing his SIDE studies whilst travelling by boat through the south of France and Corsica. Adrian's SIDE supervisor is Karen Loreck and this photo was taken during a Webex lesson on mapping.

#### SCHOOL FOCUS: SHARK BAY DHS

Shark Bay School is located in a unique cultural and natural setting approximately 828km north of Perth, on the westernmost point of Australia. The area is a World Heritage Site in the Gascoyne region and includes many natural features, most notably the seagrass beds, stromatolites and dugong populations. Indigenous history extends to 22,000 years before present time with the area being acknowledged as the traditional country of three Aboriginal language groups: Malgana, Nhanda and Yingkarta. The Malgana name for Shark Bay is Gutharraguda, which means 'two bays' or 'two waters'.

The school caters for students from Kindergarten to Year 12 and works closely with SIDE for the majority of the secondary students' curriculum. In 2021, 24 students access various subjects and courses via SIDE (see breakdown below). SIDE is also extremely pleased to be supporting the two Shark Bay Year 12 students who are pursuing their ATAR for 2021.

The trip to Shark Bay involves just over an hour's flight to Monkey Mia and then a short 10 minute drive to the school. A number of SIDE teachers and staff have visited the school in 2021. Keys4Life Plus (PK4L+) Keys For Life Plus is an award-winning driver safety education program which will be offered at SIDE in 2022. It provides a more in-depth approach to the Keys for Life pre-driver education program (PK4L). The program covers the study of road safety and driver education over a longer period (40 lessons) allowing students to achieve one-unit equivalence towards WACE over a semester.

### WHITE CARD NOW AVAILABLE THROUGH SIDE RTO

SIDE RTO continues to grow. It is now offering the 'White Card', CPCCWHS1001 Prepare to work safely in the construction industry, to schools across Western Australia. This is the minimum requirement for those wanting to enter a construction site. It is often required to work in the following industry sectors.

- Warehousing and Logistics
- Engineering
- Landscaping
- Mining

In the short time we have been running this course with Western Australian schools, 18 White Cards have been issued to students enabling them to take the next big step of entering a work site. This step can be work experience, or even into an approved training contract like a School Based Traineeship or School Based Apprenticeship.

The course provides basic knowledge in the following:

- construction work
- work health and safety laws
- common site hazards, and
- how to control the associated risks.







Many schools have already engaged the services of SIDE RTO to offer this training to their students, which has been at Leederville or in the schools.

Most recently SIDE RTO White Card training took place at Leonora District High School and Laverton District High School. The training was organised by Helen Ducey, Engagement and Transitions Manager for the Goldfields Education Region.
