







Connecting Maths and Culture



When learning about ratios in Year 7, Terry-Lee from Meekatharra District High School shared a beautiful story about how Nanna Ev takes her to their local creek to collect gum tree leaves to make tea. This is only passed from one Yamatji woman to another.

Among learning from Nanna Ev, Terry-Lee challenged herself to ratios of leaves to water in context of the information passed on. You could almost taste and smell the tea as Terry talked about it! It was amazing learning from this proud young Yamatji girl.



Staff members participated in six workshops offered by the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Mathematics Alliance. The theme for the series was Teaching Culture = Deep Learning. Led by Professor Chris Matthews, sessions explored culture as an intrinsic part of mathematics. He showed how teaching mathematics in connection to culture leads to greater engagement and conceptual understanding. With explored resources, activities with a balance of western and Indigenous knowledge.



After one of the sessions, Andrew Grieve put together an amazing resource for teaching rates, using *Aboriginal wells* and the fantastic engineering behind them.

SIDE LMS Statistics

The end of the year is a great point in time to check out how busy the SIDE Learning Management System (LMS) Moodle, is! Every day our LMS has thousands of hits from around 2000 unique student log ins. Moodle is an integral and important part of our school and we are working hard to create even more student-friendly classrooms within it.

Some interesting stats:

- We have 866 courses in our LMS
- Students log into our LMS from 52 different countries
- Our most active course for 2022 was Year 8 English with a staggering 282405 hits from February to December!
- Our top 10 most active courses have had a combined 1,973,967 hits across the last year!

SIDE uses a range of digital tools to support learning for which we need parent/caregiver consent. These programs and applications have been assessed by the Department of Education as low to medium risk and require just one consent notification called a Bundled consent. Having appropriate permissions in place means that we can provide students with richer, more diversified learning experiences.



Make sure students are ready to go by completing our 2023 parent/caregiver consent forms. These forms cover the applications we use, media and publications consent and TV/ Film ratings consent.







Great Pet Debate

As 2022 draws to a close, we have been reflecting on what an amazing year this has been for the Year 5 and 6 students and their families. Despite COVID-19 still having an impact on so many of our lives, students and parents have been persistent and committed in their approach to learning.

Year 5 students have been learning about Digital Technologies and what it means to be a responsible digital citizen. They learnt coding skills which enabled them to design their own chase games and had fun playing these with friends and family.

Year 6 students have been learning about the costs and benefits of owning a pet. They learnt about the joy of having a pet as well as the ongoing costs to keep a pet happy and healthy. Students studied *The Great Pet Debate* creating mind maps of the pets presented and also their own choice pet. A final presentation was submitted outlining the costs and benefits of their chosen pet.

Digital Technologies lessons were also included through Webex. Students learnt about the importance of having a balanced approach to using their devices and to be discerning consumers of the digital content they find on the internet.



LIBRARY RESOURCE CENTRE



A focus this term has been on promoting the onsite display of the winning books in the 2022 Environment Awards for Children's Literature, administered and awarded by the Wilderness Society and based around nature-themed narratives. The co-winners of the Picture Book Award were both WA authors. Sharing by Aunty Fay Muir and The River by Sally Morgan were published by Magabala Books here in WA.

The Non-fiction winner was The Illustrated Encyclopaedia of Peculiar Pairs in Nature by Sami Bayly and the Fiction winner was Bailey Finch Takes a Stand by Ingrid Laguna.

A new award introduced this year was the Karajia Award, which celebrates the best in First Nations storytelling for younger generations. Joint winners were Somebody's Land: Welcome to our Country by Adam Goodes and Sharing by Aunty Fay Muir (two awards for this highly acclaimed title). You can learn more at

The shortlisted and winning titles were discussed with students in a range of year levels. Including library Webex lessons with Pre Primary to Year 2 students. The reading group formed as part of the Premier's Reading Challenge in Term 3 has continued and turned into a SIDE student book club!

The Mini Industry Roadshow helps bring authentic world-of-work experiences to these schools and provide students with supplementary information to extend their career opportunities. SIDE has partnered with industry professionals in multiple fields to develop relevant and engaging workshops.

The roadshow enables the students to acknowledge and translate the transferable skills they already possess into career options that they may have never considered before. In the workshops, students build meaningful connections with the specialist role models and gain real world insight into what is involved in the industry. They learn about the different pathways to attain success, while being taught practical skills they can use immediately within their community.

The most recent Mini Industry Roadshows travelled to Kulin, Kojonup, Wagin, Roebourne, Pannawonica, Onslow, Pemberton, Northcliffe, Donnybrook and Shark Bay.

The RTO continues to provide Vocational Education and Training to students in regional and remote schools, and many students successfully completed training throughout the year from various schools, as follows:- 65 students completed a full qualification, 140 students were issued with a Whitecard and 25 students undertook the Course in Early Career Discovery.

Staff from the RTO have been working with Onslow Primary School, as well as industry representatives to develop a Job Readiness Program for students in this region. Feedback from employers in the region was used to inform the content of the course which includes modules on digital literacy, job search, work health and safety, as well as teamwork, communication and problem solving. Delivery of the course will commence in 2023.

Wayne Wilson from the RTO accompanied the Careers Team on their Industry Roadshows to Kulin, Wagin, Kojonup, Onlsow, Roebourne and Pannawonica, where he provided students with a 'taste' of plumbing, including servicing and installing a tap and sink waste, fault finding and testing. This experience was very well received and the RTO is currently working with schools to schedule similar events next year.
