Hello Parents/Caregivers, Students and members of our school community. Welcome to the first newsletter for the year.

I thank the Aboriginal custodians of the wonderful country we are connected to and pay my respects to the Elders, past and present, as we share our education journey. I am standing on Wadjuk Noongar boodjar (land) during the Djeran season as I write this article for our first newsletter in 2023.

Whilst the season in Wadjuk Noongar boodjar has seen little rain for the past three months, the situation is totally different in the Kimberley area. I want to recognise the challenges our students and communities in parts of the Kimberley, particularly Looma, Fitzroy Valley and Wananami, have had and the impact of floods on their lives. Students from the flood-impacted communities are still connecting with our educational opportunities, which shows how resilient and dedicated they are and I send them our well wishes.

Term 1 has seen some significant achievements. Our school now has 250 partner schools and 3800 students from kindy to Year 12. This is certainly our biggest number of students in recent years and indicates the trust that so many parents and schools have in SIDE.

This large number of students have, for the first time in the history of our school, been placed into a school-wide timetable. Imagine trying to establish a common timetable for 3800 students across 250 schools; it has been a massive undertaking. The new timetable is designed to create more lesson opportunities for students and take away the timetable burden from teachers so they can focus on relationships and getting to know students. I am convinced no other school has ever attempted to develop a timetable for so many partner schools and students across such a huge geographical area. And we have done it with our *can do* attitude, collaboration and communication, plus a herculean effort from Mel Kearney, our Program Coordinator.

I thank all schools and communities for their patience and willingness to give this a go. I understand there are some teething issues; however, over time we will sort these issues out.

In addition to starting the year, we also had our school review. This is a process all schools regularly go through to validate how they are going and where to next. Members of the review team were quite rightly impressed by the opportunities for students our school creates and how much we have transformed over the last 2 ½ years. In the words of the Lead Reviewer, the change journey has been "quite remarkable." I will share more details about the review and the key affirmations and recommendations once it is finalised and endorsed; however, it was a very positive moment for our school and an endorsement of the commitment of our staff.

I sought the views of a new staff member to our school and asked for three words to describe SIDE. The staff member described our school as dynamic, complex and welcoming. That is a pretty good indicator of our current environment, with the change agenda occurring, and is an interesting perspective from a new teacher.

As we head into a break from the rigours of our teaching and learning programs, I thank all staff for their efforts and embracing our change agenda, which takes us on the path to even better opportunities for students. Our staff deserve their break, as do students.

Year 12s, do use this moment for some extra revision and study. Your formal secondary schooling now only has 2 ½ terms remaining, so please make every moment count.







MATHEMATICS



The Mathematics Department has had a busy start to the year and has welcomed two new members of staff: Narelle Torrance and Shavaurn Hanson. Narelle has a country background, attending a small district high school in Midwest WA. This gives her an excellent insight into the different backgrounds of some of our regional students. Narelle has taught in both city and regional schools and is very excited to have joined the Maths team at SIDE:

"I have loved learning the technology SIDE uses to deliver unique lessons to students and developing ways to engage and deliver content to SIDE's varied cohort. Meeting and getting to know my students has been the highlight so far. In a single lesson I might have students in the Pilbara, Goldfields, Midwest, Perth, interstate or even overseas. I really look forward to supporting these students in their online learning environment during 2023."

Shavaurn has joined us this term to teach the Mathematics Essentials and Foundations courses. These courses offer students the opportunity to consolidate and review fundamental skills in maths that are highly applicable to everyday life and employment contexts. Along with their teacher, students are often working to regain their confidence and modify the incorrect self-belief that "I am no good at maths." Time is spent on establishing better understanding of core concepts such as place value and multiplicative thinking.

"We work with the students, carefully identifying and addressing where there might be certain gaps in their prior knowledge. This helps break down some of those barriers and means that learning new mathematical concepts is not as confronting for the students."

SCIENCE

As the SIDE teaching locations have expanded in 2023, so too has the capacity of Science teachers to deliver more interesting, relevant and exciting hands-on activities to students. Teaching spaces now have motion-based cameras that, when used in combination with document cameras, allow the delivery of many more live investigations, experiments and demonstrations.






Students have made a wonderful start to online lessons this term and we have been very impressed with how they have adapted so quickly to using the tools and annotations in Webex.

Students started the year producing their student bios for the Upper Primary Moodle page and for display in the Upper Primary classroom here at SIDE. It's a great way to learn about others in the class.


This term, Year 5 students have been studying adaptation in Biological Science and have been creating diagrams of their own plants and creatures showing adaptations to their unusual environments.





Subsidies

The Financial Assistance for Isolated Children Scheme (AICS) may be available to parents of full-time SIDE students studying from home or within a school. For more information, contact your SIDE Student Coordinator or visit:

Assistance for Isolated Children Scheme - Australian Government Department of Human Services

The Student Subsidised Travel Scheme can provide financial and practical assistance for targeted Year 12 students to attend WACE revision seminars. Subject to scheme conditions, students deemed eligible for student travel subsidies may be entitled to a number of travel supports each academic year:

- 8 round road trips per family under the road travel subsidy.
- 4 return air/bus/train trips for school students under a subsidised fare.



In 2022, the RTO added the 5291 WA course in Early Career Discovery to its scope. It was anticipated that this opportunity for Year 9 students to undertake an accredited course would be sought after by schools, and this has been the case. In Term 1, six schools from across the state enrolled their students into the course with 127 students enrolled to date. We expect that a lot of students will achieve their first ever VET unit of competency over the next few weeks.

The RTO has recently expanded its service to schools who are engaging with us to deliver the Whitecard face to face to include a hands-on and practical plumbing experience. (Pictured above)

Students have learned how to install and service tapware and P-trap waste kits, as well as being involved in the live testing of installations, fault finding and re-testing. This has been really well received by students, as it offers an opportunity to participate in a realistic plumbing task. We are currently in the process of developing more experiences to include electrical, horticulture and information technology.

The delivery of **AHC21020 Certificate II** in Conservation and Ecosystem Management and **AHC10216 Certificate I** in AgriFood Operations were able to commence this term and are currently being delivered to students in the Southwest, Metro, Wheatbelt, Pilbara and Kimberley regions.
