HUMANITIES AND SOCIAL SCIENCES

Term Two was a busy, exciting time for our Humanities and Social Science students.

Year Sevens studied consuming, producing and entrepreneurial skills.

Year Eights studied economic concepts, types of businesses and developed plans for a "pop-up business". Australia and the global economy was the Year Nine focus and our Year Tens studied living standards and economic performance.

Year 11 Geography students studied "natural and ecological hazards", Economics students studied the fascinating insights of "Micro-Economics", Year 11 History students studied Capitalism in the USA with a focus on the "roaring Twenties" and the "New Deal". Year 11 Accounting students focused on the Financial Environment, Balance sheets and Financial Decisions studies . Year 11 Politics and Law (we now teach both ATAR and General versions of these courses) studied "Democracy and the Rule of Law". Year 12 students studied "Global Environmental Change" (in Geography), China or Australia in the Twentieth Century (in History), International Trade (in Economics) and Political and Legal Power (in Politics and Law). Year 12 Accounting focused on Cost - Volume - Profit, investing and the Financial Environment.

HaSS organised the visit of several expert guest speakers to add to the depth and interest of students' studies.

Staff have visited many students in Regional and metropolitan areas. Year 11 and 12 Business Management Enterprise students developed skills and understandings essential to the day-to-day running, continuing viability and expansion of a business

Science Regional Visits

The Science Department is one of the biggest at SIDE, delivering an extensive range of lower school, general and ATAR courses to students throughout Western Australia and the world. Of particular importance is reaching out to all students whenever possible to ensure the best possible academic outcomes.

In Term 2, the Science Department visited many schools across the state including Karratha, Kununurra, Exmouth, Tom Price, Newman and Shark Bay. The teachers were extremely excited to meet face to face with their students. For some perspective, just a few of the subjects covered in these trips included Year 11 and 12 ATAR Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Human Biology, Psychology and lower school sciences.

Throughout these visits, SIDE staff were able to provide students with invaluable 1 on 1 assistance, working through specific problems and giving the students advice on how best to prepare for their examinations. The staff provided extra resources including tailored worksheets and packages, and delivered specialist textbooks which are difficult to purchase in remote locations.

The Science teachers gained a better understanding of the many and varied challenges that regional and remote students face in their education and the need for SIDE to continue to strive to deliver the course materials in the best possible way. SIDE teachers look forward to many great opportunities to connect with the students in locations across the state.

National Simultaneous Story Time took place on the 24 May. 'The Speedy Sloth' by Rebecca Young was read to the students by Liz Allen. Our students were just a few out of thousands nation-wide who listened to the same story on the same day.

Liz Allen from the Resource Centre has discussed various books and authors, during Webex lessons, with some of the focus being on graphic novels. It's a fantastic learning opportunity for our students.

Year 6 students studied a wide range of sets and topics this term. In 'It's A Novel Idea' the novel *Blueback* by Tim Winton was studied. In Maths students collected data on using muscles and used a recipe for making chocolate cakes to sell at a charity.

Chemical Change was the focus in Science this term with students conducting many varied experiments.

They had fun discovering what happens to a substance when it is heated and cooled. Students had the opportunity to melt chocolate, cook pancakes and dissolve sugar. Their reports on observations and results were accurate and it was pleasing to see most students use scientific notation correctly.

In History, Year 5 students have been learning about and researching the Swan River Colony and people who made a difference to the lives of early settlers.
