
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A MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

she told The National Indigenous Times.

Lucia's travels have allowed her many opportunities to pursue her dream. A highlight for her was visiting King Charles III during his trip to Australia from the 18th to 23rd of October. The future is bright for Lucia, and she has an understanding of how she is being represented.

Australia was a significant change.
Back home, the education system
was more traditional, with a focus

surprise. I quickly realize hard
learning style, finding it both exciting
and dedicated to learning new
things.

One unique aspect of my education was the SIDE (School of Isolated and Distance Education) lessons. At first, I was unsure about online learning, but I soon found it to be a valuable resource. The flexibility allowed me to learn, and the interactive lessons made complex topics more accessible. I appreciated how the teachers were supportive, making sure we felt connected even though we were physically apart. This experience taught me selfdiscipline and to work hard to study skills that I know will be beneficial in my future studies.

As I navigate my schooling in Western Australia, at Halls
Creek my aspirations for the future are becoming a marine pilot. After when I finish schooling in high school, and I dream of learning a degree in oceanography and communication efforts.
And volunteering in a pool as a pool lifeguard like work experiences. Here have inspired me to learn new things. I hope to work with organisations focused on marine pilots, bringing my experiences from the Philippines and Australia."

He gained valuable experience through work placements at the Truck Centre, DFES, and SPOL, where he developed practical skills and a better understanding of different industries. In Year 12 he completed a Certificate II in Automotive Vocational preparation skill set through South Metropolitan TAFE. On top of all of this. Michael also completed Keys for Life and was successful in the OLNA numeracy assessment.

THE SHIRES

Working at the shires is an amazing way to gain experience and give back to the community. Several students have completed work placement at their shires, including Year 11s Brandon S from Wongan Hills and John H from Quairading.

Brandon S has been seen around the school garden and he was excited to bring his skills to the Shire of Wongan Ballidu. He has taken on responsibilities such as mowing, planting, mulching, reticulation systems, minor repairs on tools and even more.'

"Since I had significantly gained more experience with working for the Shire, which is a Agricultural industry, I have a wide range of skills to use for my desired job in the future."

John H already had a connection with the Shire of Quairading as his father is a Councillor. He has been busy as he rotates between three main shire services. When working at the depot, he installs signs or accessories around town, gardening and fixing systems like retic on shire properties.

At the Community Resource Centre, he looks for grants and quotes for shire projects and makes up spreadsheets. During his third service in the shire building, he served customers over the phone, finished jobs from the CRC and completed tasks for the CEO, Natalie Ness, which included writing reports using Word and Excel.

"My favourite thing about working for the Shire being a part of and working with the team as they are all very kind to me and amazing people to work with. Another thing is simply doing tasks assigned to me, as it helps the community, and I am hopefully lightening the workload of my seniors since they are all very busy."

Levi volunteers with the Wongan Hills Volunteer Fire and Rescue Service. He often spends time building skills with hands-on simulations, including removing doors from cars and how to support cars that were flipped.

Levi shared his excitement;

"For the upside down one I actually got to use the jaws of life to cut the hinges off the door."


LOOKING AFTER HOUSE

EGYPTIAN WATER SCARCITY

With students based all around the world, HaSS is the perfect opportunity to learn more about their homes. The Year 7s learnt about water scarcity in Term 4 while studying geography, and Kaden A. researched Egypt.



KADEN A. AND HIS DOG

Water scarcity is important for Kaden as he lives in an olive farm with an assortment of animals, ranging from chickens and rabbits to water buffalo. He was able to combine what he had experienced in his everyday life with the technical aspects he had to learn for school. Kaden shares his research.

"Egypt faces both physical and economic water scarcity.
On our farm, for example, we use groundwater to irrigate the olive trees, but it's salty, and we cannot drink it, so we have to drive at least 10km to fill jerry cans with fresh water for drinking and cooking. There are many villages across Egypt where poor people don't have access to freshwater in their homes, so they often have people donate money to get them connected.

Most of the freshwater comes from the Nile, but that is shared with other countries, and this can often cause conflicts, and the government have to cooperate with other countries. Egypt has created many desalination plants to increase water supply."

Kaden's incredible work with the water scarcity assignment gave him a stronger understanding of the land he calls home.

YOUTH PARLIAMENT

During the July school holidays, students experienced political life by participating in Youth Parliament, connecting with peers and learning to impact their communities. SIDE students from Gosnells, Wiluna, and Morawa proudly represented their school.

Morawa student Peta H has a strong passion for Politics and Law. She received this year's Certificate of Excellence from the Law Society of Western Australia and was selected to be the Leader of the Opposition during her time at Youth Parliament.

"Youth Parliament is an amazing experience that enables young people to voice the issues most important to them and their electorates. The program immerses participants in the world of politics, legislation, lawmaking and debate, actively enhancing their knowledge and leadership skills. Being elected as the 2024 Youth Leader of the Opposition was an immense honour and opportunity to play a key role in the program."

Wiluna student Salina L has a strong passion for caring about her community. Alongside her mother, Salina is organising the KindiLink in the Wiluna Remote Community School, a play-and-learn initiative for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children. She attended Youth Parliament with the support of Principal Emily Vandenberg.

"I had never thought of learning about it in such a powerful and respectful way. My favourite part is hearing about every other young strong person and the problems they deal with in their communities,"

Does Australia need a Bill of Rights?

This was the topic Year 11 Politics discussed at the WA Schools Constitutional Convention on the 12th of September. Students Ariah C and Matilda T were a part of this excursion, where they were able to share their opinions on the introduction of a Bill of Rights into Australia.

Ariah from Dale Christian School attended the session in person.

"The day consisted of interactive activities at the tables, with sessions focused on, 'How rights are protected in Australia's democracy', 'Human Rights', 'Plebiscites', and a comparison of the 'protection of rights', where my table looked at Canada. This excursion encouraged me to view things differently,"

Ariah said.

Matilda from Hedland Senior High School currently works as a youth engagement officer. She attended the convention to broaden her understanding of the constitution and its role in Australia's political and legal system.

"I am studying Politics and Law because I am passionate about making a change and advocating for those who don't have a voice, and I hope to one day be doing that as a lawyer," Matilda reflected.

When asked whether Australia needs a Bill of Rights, Matilda replied with an emphatic 'yes.'

"I believe Australia does need a Bill of Rights to further enforce rights, as we are a democracy. However, I think it's incredible that we are one of the only democracies that doesn't have one, yet still function so well."

KEYS4LIFE



Getting a driver's licence can be a major accomplishment, and it all starts with receiving the Learner's Permit. Year 10 Rhiarn from Leinster Community School learnt how to be a safe driver though the Keys4Life program in Term 3.

In these lessons, she spent time dedicated to understanding all the road rules that will be needed for the rest of her life

"I really like the Keys4Life program because not only does it benefit individual students, but it also contributes positively to community safety by promoting safer driving behaviours among young people, The Keys4Life program is a valuable source for young drivers as it prepares them for the real-world challenges behind the wheel,"

she said.

Apart from creating safe drivers, this program also exempts students from taking the online theoretical test, creating a straight path to their Learner's Permit. Riarn has advice for future participants of the program, who may include her younger sister Lexi, a current Year 9 student.

"Starting the Keys for Life program can be a intimidating experience and it's important to approach it with an open mind and the intention and attitude to learn, doing the programme can increase your chances of success and can create a brighter future for themselves by becoming more confident. If it gets overwhelming at some point that's ok! Its normal to be a bit nervous because well you probably haven't driven before but give it some time and keep persisting and you will get there!"

If you're in Leinster, you may start seeing Riarn drive around as she recently turned 16 and is excited to get behind the wheel.

The Year 10 Health students focused on metal health disorders and produced infographics to help explain a topic that is commonly misunderstood.


Monica's approach to the assignment a was beautiful refection of her empathy;

"I enjoyed learning about the many different mental health disorders, specifically the one I studied - Bipolar Disorder. I chose it because I know people with the disorder, and wanted to better understand what they're going through. I really enjoyed researching and creating my infographic for the task, and found that I remembered most of the information I wrote. It has helped me to better understand people with Bipolar Disorder."

It was a beneficial task that many students, including Keelie, found valuable in changing their perception of their chosen disorder. Keelie chose to focus on anxiety and explains;

"I found this task very enlightening. Through the process of completing this task I learnt about how common anxiety disorders truly are in Australia and how they affect peoples day to day lives. Whilst I always heard the term anxiety I never truly understood what it was or the variation within the severity, this task informed of the differences and ways to support and treat these disorders."

This assignment not only educates, it also helps students develop compassion, as proven by Monica and Keelie.

ITALIAN CONVERSATION CLASSES

Every Thursday, Year 11 students Ashley and Franz from Governor Stirling High school attend private conversation classes with Italian: Second Language Assistant Giorgia Guidi.

"During our 1:1 conversation classes, each of them of 40 minutes duration, we focus on their Oral Communication Questions they have to prepare about specific topics related to the SCSA Italian: Second Language syllabus, such as 'Viaggiare oggi' (Travel in a modern world) – in which students consider how technology is changing world travel, influencing how people plan their holidays and communicate while they are away – the last of all topics we have been working on for this school year.

We usually check their written responses together, going through the grammatical contents and structures, spelling and pronunciation and we practice them orally so that they become more confident for their oral assessments and exam, during which they will be asked about those questions and topics.

For some of the topics like "Destinazione Italia" (Destination Italy) – in which students explore travelling in a particular Italian region or city and explore tourist attractions and cultural experiences – I made use of videos or ad hoc resources I created for the students, such as Power Point presentations about Italian regions that they can easily study to address specific questions.

Throughout the school year, Ashley and Franz have been seriously working on their Italian and I could really notice their progress. I am very content to have had the privilege to meet them and support them in their Italian oral practice!"




FRENCH CLASSES COME TOGETHER

While SIDE RTO is not on the list of RTOs who can support the training for a School-Based Traineeship, the school and Delena's preference was for her to continue with the Certificate II in Kalamburu with SIDE RTO, rather than Delena having to travel to Broome to complete her traineeship. SIDE RTO and Kalumburu negotiated an effective partnership with North Regional TAFE that meant that Delena could remain on country with her classmates at Kalumburu, and continue her studies as well as her traineeship.

Delena continues to make excellent progress and hopes to achieve her goal of becoming a local ranger at the completion of her School-Based Traineeship. With the skills she has learnt during her training she is well equipped to do so. The animals and plant life in Kulamburu will be safe under Delena's protection.

A STRONG PARTNERSHIP FOR SUCCESSFUL STUDENTS

Congratulations to all who progressed or completed their qualifications. This year marked the first for students from Midland Learning Academy and WCSESC participating in SIDE RTO courses, with outstanding efforts all around.

At Midland Learning Academy, students enrolled in a number of Certificates, including the BSBB20120 Certificate II in Workplace Skills, FSK20119 Certificate II in Skills for Work and Vocational Pathways and AHC21020 Certificate II in Conservation and Ecosystem Management.

WOMEN IN PHYSICS

Professor Susan Coppersmith

Year 9 and 10 dance students had a break from choreography and pointe to learn about the exciting world of quantum computing.

In August, they had the pleasure of being the audience of the Women in Physics lecture hosted by Professor Susan Coppersmith. Susan is a Theoretical Condensed Matter Physicist who is known for her range of experience in topics such as nanotechnology, nanoscience and quantum physics. YEAR 8 STEM AT ONSLOW

The Year 8 students became physicists and engineers in Term 3 as they created Rube-Goldberg machines. Through the use of everyday materials and different energy transformations, they created machines that carry out simple task such as watering a plant or pressing a button on a remote.

It was a challenge, giving students a chance to test their innovation and perseverance skills. While some students worked together in their school to create the machine, others worked independently using what they could find around their home. Whether it be tennis balls, scraps of metal, or cement blocks.

said Year 8 student, Rex.

While their efforts may have rewarded them a strong mark in science, it also allowed them to use their imagination and develop their understanding of kinetic energy.





From the 9th to the 17th of August, science students enjoyed National Science Week. This year's theme 'Species Survival – More than just sustainability' allowed them to discuss the importance of ensuring the existence of all the animals that may be taken for granted.

Marine biologist and host of Discovery Channel's Shark Soup presented a Webex session on sharks – an interest for many of the students. This session was open to all year groups. While they could already list various types of sharks and share the trivia, they learnt many new facts. All of their questions were answered throughout the session. Whether they become future shark biologists or just become aware of the creatures that roam our waters, it was a valuable lesson for all.

While some students were independent participants of the class, school groups also came together and joined in on the session. They were able to learn about the marine creature and share their passion for the subject with other students – some of whom may not have been in the same classes as them.

Throughout their lessons during Week 5 of Term 3, science students completed extra activities that showcased the importance of this subject.
