INSIDE SIDE: Principal's Welcome

Hello members of our school community and welcome to the first newsletter for the year.

As I write this section, standing on Noongar Whadjuk Boodja (country) here in Boorloo (Perth), the cooler mornings and shorter days indicate that Bunuru season is making way for Djeran. Meanwhile, across our State, some of our students are experiencing very different weather patterns, including flooding in parts of the Eucla, Goldfields and South Interior.

After taking on another role for the last six months of the 2023 school year, it is so rewarding to be back and leading some wonderful opportunities for our students across Western Australia and the globe. I want to acknowledge the wonderful job **Laura Moore** did as the Principal in my absence late last year to keep things moving and our change agenda focused.

I am really excited about opportunities being developed at our school, on top of the existing curriculum access and excellent teaching experiences we provide. There is innovative work being led by the Regional Teaching Team, working closely with remote schools and community members in the Kimberley and North Country to provide even more relevant and enjoyable learning experiences for our students. There are some photos in this newsletter of some students and staff connecting in the Kimberley region.

You may have seen the Minister's announcement last year about the additional funding for our school, which indicates the confidence our government has in the educational opportunities provided by our staff. This is also reflected in our student enrolment numbers being within arms reach of 4000 across 269 schools. We have also had 15 new teachers joining us for the start of the school year and it is always pleasing to see new ideas coming into our school.

As you will be aware, the Department of Education is negotiating with the State School Teachers Union (SSTUWA) to reach an industrial agreement. The SSTUWA has proposed a stop work industrial action for a half day on Tuesday April 23rd. The strike action will see disruption to some classes in the morning with teachers returning ready to resume the normal program at 12:30pm. A significant number of SIDE teachers will be involved in this action.

We will remain open and students who are on site at Leederville will be supervised, safe and participating in a modified program until all teachers return to work. Further communication will be sent via email and Connect. Students participating in the OLNA testing on Tuesday are required to attend at Leederville.

The very short nine-week term has raced by and it won't be long now before our senior school students are commencing Semester One exams. Remember not to leave revision and assessment to the last minute, get organised and start your preparation now senior school students!

Parents/care givers if you did not get the chance to speak with teachers during the parent/care giver meetings held in the last week of Term, remember you are always able to contact teachers directly.

As the popularity and need for Guide Dogs and Autism Support Dogs is growing in our community, I felt compelled to volunteer to become a puppy raiser. I knew that as a part time teacher I was well placed to offer my support and time. Dogs like Ojo will work alongside Autistic children at school so an important part of his training is learning to be calm and patient while I work at SIDE both in the classroom and office.





ONLINE TEACHING AND LEARNING



What do the OTL and ICT teams do?

The Online Teaching and Learning (OTL) and the Information and Communication Technologies (ICT) teams work together to support SIDE staff, students and supervisors, to deliver and access their teaching and learning programs. Students have discovered how their laptop/computer screens suddenly become interactive whiteboards and are now adept users of the Webex tools. The Year 3's and 4's students attended a Cyber Safety incursion titled Friendship gaming agreement. Webex classes have been run as a Year 4 and 5 group, with the focus on literacy and numeracy. 
